## DISASTERS of '93-94

## Flood, Fire, Earthquake and Ice!

## Mississippi Floods; Malibu Burns; Los Angeles Hit by Quake

In the summer of 1993 the Midwestern U. S. was devastated by the Great Flood on the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers. Caused by excessive rain, it covered eight million acres over nine states; 12 million more were too wet to plant. Property damages totalled over $\$ 12$ billion and 70,000 people lost their homes. Congress passed a $\$ 6.2$ billion flood-relief package which President Clinton signed in August.

October 26 fire raged through six counties in Southern California burning over 186 acres and 700 homes. Less than a week later more fires swept over Mailbu and Topanga Canyon killing three and burning another 300 homes. Thousands were evacuated.

It continued into 1994. January 17 an earthquake of 6.6 magnitude hit the Los Angeles area before daybreak on what would have been a holiday for many (Martin Luther King Day) causing highways to crumble and an apartment house to collapse. More than 60 were killed, thousands injured and over three million people lost electricity. Water mains broke and gas line breaks erupted in fires. After-shocks kept thousands living outdoors for weeks afraid their damaged homes might yet collapse.

In Tennessee, Arkansas and Mississippi an ice storm hit on February 9 and worsened February 12. Thousands lost electricity due to falling tree limbs and utility poles. Streets and roads were blocked by trees; walking and driving were nearly impossible in places. Southern Tennessee and Mississippi were worst hit and required weeks to get electric service back to normal.

OTHER EVENTS of '93-94
Feb. 26 New York's World Trade Center was heavily damaged by a car bomb planted by Muslim fundamentalists; 6 die, over 1,000 injured.
Feb. 28 the raid on David Koresh's Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas resulted in 4 A.T.F. agents' deaths, a long siege and burning of the compound in April.
Mar. 10 Dr. David Gunn was killed as he entered an abortion clinic in Pensacola, FL by a pro-life demonstrator.
June 23 Lorena Bobbitt was arrested for mutilating her husband after years of abuse. In later trials both were acquitted of charges but made front pages for months.
June 30 in Marion, IN Julia Roberts wed Lyle Lovett. July 19 Pres. Clinton announces homosexuals will be allowed to serve in military services with restrictions. Aug. 22 Michael Jackson is charged with child abuse while on a world tour. He settled a lawsuit out-of-court. Aug. 30 David Letterman opened his Late Show on C.B.S. Sept. 22 Amtrak's worst wreck occurred in LA killing 47 when a derailed train went into a bayou.
Oct. 3 in Somalia 12 American soldiers were killed and 75 injured. Helicopter pilot Michael Durant of Clarksville, TN was captured and released a few days later.
Oct. 7 Toni Morrison wins the Nobel Prize for literature. Nov. 20 N.A.F.T.A. passed Congress in spite of Ross Perot's debate against it with V.P. AI Gore on TV.
Jan. 1,'94 Gov. McWherter's TennCare Program replacing Medicaid goes into effect.
Feb. 4 Jesse Misskelley, first of 3 teens to be tried for deaths of 3 boys last summer, in West Memphis, AR, was found guilty after testimony involving Satanism.

## Local Student Works in Flood Relief Effort



Senior Torin Brooks traveled to Festus/Crystal City, Missouri in August with others from his church to help save a congregation there. Torin stated that the flood waters around the church were eight feet deep, but ranged from four to 13 feet in the area. Civilian volunteers and National Guardsmen constantly sandbagged to protect the church. "Every time we came in from working, we had to wash our hands with bleach," said Torin. This was because of the garbage that floated in the flood water. The night time was worst because of the swarms of mosquitoes and insects the floating garbage attracted, but in closing Torin stated "The best part was that the church was saved because all the people worked together to save it."

On Jan. 10, 1994 promoters of the Gibson Co. Lake saw their efforts rewarded when the county commission voted to fund their share of the cost of the 568 acre lake east of Trenton. Rep. Paul Phelan said the lake should help flood control and would give access to water recreation for our area.

When returning to work at a Milan factory after lunch Jan. 10 Ronnie Nelson, a P.H.S. alumni, was shot in the back. Later that day his wife, her daughter Elizabeth Allison, and a man from Elkhart, Indiana were arrested for murder. Elizabeth graduated from P.H.S. in 1993. The motive was said to be revenge for Nelson's abuse.

# Our Fourth Exchange Student Arrives In January from Bucharest, Romania.

I am 17 years old and I obtained a scholarship offered by Soros Foundation in collaboration with Open Door Student Exchange for a five month stay in the U.S.A. I wanted the scholarship because I enjoy meeting new people and learning about various lifestyles and cultures.

My father is an engineer and my mother is an economist. My sister is 18 and we attend the same school. Bucharest is a city of about 2,000,000 people.

There are similarities and differences between Romanian and American schools. We start school at age six and finish at 18 . Our school day starts at 7:30 a.m. and ends at 1:30 p.m. because we don't have a break for lunch. We have a ten minute break between classes when we can go to the school buffet and buy something to eat. High school students in Romania usually have six classes a day, but these are different each day because we study 14 different subjects. The grades are also different. We get grades from 1 to 10 and 5 or above is a passing grade.

Although I have lots of homework to do (up to six hours a day), I still have time for fun. After school I usually go with friends to the city center where we buy something to eat or go to a movie. I go to the British Council Library or American Cultural Center where I can read magazines or borrow a book. Weekends I love taking long walks in a beautiful park in Bucharest. On Saturday we usually have parties that last well into the night.

My plans for the future include university and maybe a career in computers.

# PEABODY'S CZECH CONNECTION Not One But Two

My Name is Jara Kohout and I am a foreign exchange student. I came to the United States through the Open Door Foundation with twenty other students from the Czech Republic. My home is in Prague, the capital of our Republic. It has approximately one and one-half million inhabitants. Prague, like most European cities, is much older than American cities. It was officially founded at the beginning of the 13 th century, although it was first settled as a market place on the banks of the Moldau River much earlier.

In Prague I attended Gynazium Nad Aleji, a high school with special classes taught by English speaking instructors. My school has about 800 students interested mainly in academic educations. The length of time required for getting academic titles is shorter, because the information taught is more concentrated than in American schools. Students enrolled in vocational or technical programs attend different types of high schools. Another difference is our schools do not have school affiliated sports teams. We participate in organized sports sponsored by companies in our leisure time after school.

I appreciate the friendliness of the students and the faculty and I am really enjoying my time here. I would like to thank my family in Prague for giving me the opportunity to visit this country and my host family in Trenton for their warm hospitality during my stay.

(Jana) My home country is the Czech Republic. The capital of my country is Prague and it is where my family lives. Prague is a large and old city, founded in the 10th century.

My family lives in a calm quarter of Prague. We have a house with a large garden. I have one sister, 19 years old; she studies law. My father is a financial officer and my mother is a patent officer. We have two cats at home. Our whole family has one major hobby: horses.

My school is one of the larger schools. There are about 800 students. This kind of school is called "gymnasium" and gives you a general education. It is attended four years. To attend high school students have to pass exams on math and the Czech language.

The schools in my country are more difficult. Teachers give oral exams and written tests. Twice a year students get a report card.

Each class has a made schedule. Students study subjects for four years, but have about 13 subjects in a week, not every day the same. At the end of the fourth year, they have to pass exams from four subjects they choose to graduate. Then they can go to university or get a job.

My name is Irina Lobodina. I am from Russia, Kalmyk Republic, town of Elista. Elista is the capital of the Kalmyk Republic. I am 15 years old. My father's name is Alxander and my mother's name is Tamara. I have a sister, Oxana. She is 19 years old. My father is the chief of the republic police department. My mother is the headmaster of the town school. My sister is studying in Rostov-on-Don Institute with her husband. I have a dog. She is very small and her name is Laska.

There are 150,000 people in my town. Elista is a political, economical and cultural center of the republic. There are several plants and factories, four theaters, cinemas, large park, 22 schools and our White House. We have our own president. He was elected April 11, 1993. He is very young and rich. We don't have taxes in the Kalmyk Republic now. He is concerned about our wealth.

I am studying in the town lyceum. There is only one lyceum in the republic. Our high school is not big. There are 210 students. We have large competitions before we can study there. There are 20 students in my class. We have four types of classes: physics/advanced mathematics, chemistry/biology, humanities and esthetics. You may attend one course for three years. We study six days a week.

One month during the summer students across the state of Tennessee are given the opportunity to participate in Governor's School. There are six schools from which to choose.
